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Dr. Don Benning, superintendent of the Dept. of Human-Community Relations Service for the Omaha Public School has a long list of noteworthy accomplishments.

As a collegiate he was a student football and wrestling star at the University of Nebraska. He was later the first Black coach at UNO coaching the wrestling team and leading them to national prominence and a national NAIA title in 1970. He has as a coach trained numerous All-American wrestlers. Prior to his appointment to the Dept. of Human-Community Relations he was assistant principal at Omaha Central High School. 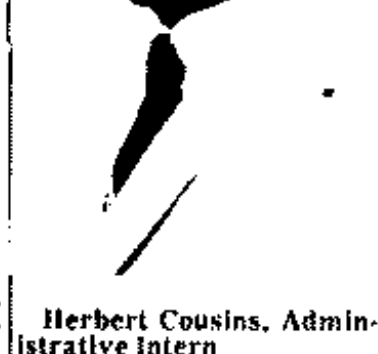

She began her career in 1959 as a teacher at Lake, where she remained for 7 years, two years with the National Teacher Core, one year with the child study program as co-ordinator, and three years as principal at Lake, from 1969 to 1972. Since 1972 she has held her current position at Conestoga. She received a B.S. from Alcorn A & M College and a M.S. from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Warren Taylor, who is presently principal of Lothrop School, has been with Omaha Public Schools for 28 years. He started in 1962 for one year at Kennedy, followed by twelve years at Kellom. In 1965 he went to Lothrop as an administrative intern, followed by the assistant principal position in 1966 and coordinator of community counselors in 1967. He has been principal at Lothrop for 13 years. He holds a B.S. and M.A. degree from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Mrs. Juanita Moore has been with Omaha Public Schools for 24½ years. She served as teacher at Long from 1957 to 1959, at Lothrop from 1959 to 1967, as administrative assistant at Lothrop in 1967-68, and as principal at Kennedy from 1968 until the present time. Doug Morrow came to Technical Junior as a science teacher in 1966. In 1968 he became administrative intern at Technical Junior, followed two years later as visiting teacher for one year, and was promoted to assistant principal at Technical Junior in 1972. He was assistant principal the following year at Hale Junior, where he remained until 1976 when he was named assistant principal at Central High, where he is currently. He holds a B.S. from Tennessee State University and a M.S. from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.

Mrs. Marjorie Norwood has 28 years of service with the Omaha Public Schools. She started in 1949 at Long as a teacher where she stayed until 1953, when she moved to Kennedy. In 1954 she took a year off, then returned to Kennedy for three years, followed by ten years at Lothrop. In 1968 she was assigned assistant principal at Clifton Hill for two years, followed by six years as principal at Monmouth Park. Since 1977 she has served a dual job as principal at Franklin and Monmouth Park. She holds a B.A. and M.S. from the University of Nebraska at Omaha.
