WOWT Reporter Ray Metoyer Named To New Post

Ray Metoyer has been named to the newly-created post of Urban Affairs Reporter at WOWT, according to Steve Murphy, News Director. The appointment is effective immediately.

Metoyer, who most recently was weekend anchorman and reporter, will operate out of an Urban Affairs Bureau in the city-county building in downtown Omaha.

Murphy says, "In many ways, we anticipate that Ray will function to some extent as a third 'anchor' — a field anchor who will report urban affairs daily in WOWT newscasts, often from remote locations. We see this as an innovative addition to our newscasts and another first in Omaha television news."

A graduate of Creighton Prep and the University of Nebraska at Lincoln with a degree in broadcast journalism, 27-year old Metoyer began his broadcast career as a Lincoln correspondent for WOWT while he was a UNL student in 1971. Even before his college years, Metoyer was part of broadcasting as a member of the Junior Achievement group at WOWT.
