


Outlook Is Promising for City Gardens, Says Ihm

The outlook is promising for many city gardens, says Joe Ihm, director of garden work with the public welfare board in the city hall. The soil is in better condition this year than for several seasons, according to G. W. Hood, head of the horticulture department of the Nebraska university, owing to the moisture having penetrated deeply, and already plans are being made for gardens.

During the last week Mr. Ihm spoke to Omaha school children from fourth to eighth grades in the Madison, Corrigan, Florence, South Central, St. Mary's, the School of the Assumption, and the Howard Kennedy, and explained juvenile garden

plans.

Three young girls, Inger Peterson, Ruby Crippon and Irma Swoboda, of the Howard Kennedy school, won the city championship in canning garden produce last season, and this school will maintain a school garden this summer, with 100 boys and girls each having his or her individual plot.

This is the second season that garden work will have been conducted under government direction. Persons wishing ground for gardens should fill out the coupon and mail it to the public welfare board in the city hall. Mayor Smith and many real estate agents are co-operating to supply suitable lots for gardens.
