## Cooler in Sight Mercury Soars

The thermometer soured to a new record level today but relief from the five-day heat wave was

promised for Saturday.

The 1 o'clock reading here was 96 as compared with the previous record high of 93 for September 15, set in 1927. The eastern part of the state continued to bake ( but slightly cooler temperatures were noted in panhandle Nebraska.

Probable thundershowers were forecast for this afternoon or tonight. Somewhat cooler weather tonight and partly cloudy was predicted for Saturday.

For the third day in a row, elementary schools were missed at noon. High schools

dismissed early.

The closing order came after Superintendent of Schools Homer Anderson, hesitating again to stop class work, made a personal tour of schools. At Howard Kennedy school he found several pupils suffering from nosebleeds that, nurses reported, were induced by the heat.
