Dr. Kathryne Taylor Favors, a former Omaha teacher, will conduct a workshop at the Pedagogy and Theatre of the Oppressed Conference for the University of Nebraska at Omaha on March 6, 1998. After retiring with forty-six years in the public schools as a teacher and administrator for almost thirty years, Dr. Favors is an assistant professor at National University in Sacramento, California.

While in Omaha, Dr. Favors will also attend the Delta's Founder's Day Luncheon as she is one of the three living charter members of the Delta's Gamma XI Chapter. She also plans to attend the CASE Dinner of which her brother, Warren Taylor, is a very active member. She loves to visit Omaha and truly enjoys the native Omaha activities. She looks forward to seeing her relatives and her old friends. She was a member Pilgrim Baptist Church and Zion Baptist when she was in Omaha and looks forward to visiting at least one of the churches during the Sunday that she is in Omaha.

Dr. Favors has spoken at conferences and/or in school districts in New York, Florida, Washington, D.C., Washington State, Missouri, Iowa, Ohio, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Oregon, Illinois, Texas, Georgia and throughout the state of California. Later in March, she will speak in Illinois. She speaks on topics related to education and related to the latest book by both Dr. Kathryne Favors and her husband, Dr. John Favors. Presently, their book, "Thematic Integrated Education" has been purchased in forty-five states and several foreign countries for public and private schools and for home-schooled children. It is an attempt to bring excellent educational practice to help develop children and youth to their highest potential. Both she and her husband, Dr. Favors, have received many honors for their work with children and youth but they feel that they are honored to have an opportunity to work with these young people because they need a strong educational foundation in order to make a contribution to themselves and to their communities.
