
MIT AN UNTIMELY END.

The remains of Alvah Boots were interred in Forest Lawn cemetery yesterday afternoon, the funeral services being held at his late home, 3021 Corby street. He was only 17 years old, but for the last year and a half his lot had been cast among strangers. In July of 1890, desirous of seeing the world, he left the family hearth and started out in life for himself. He wandered first into the sunny south, but his health falling he went north and secured work on the lakes. Better health and some prosperity followed and, though a boy, he soon took the part of a man. During his entire absence his fond parents regularly received from him letters full of courage and comfort. Monday last, after suffering three days with pneumonia, he died at his hotel in Tomahawk, Wis.

Mr. Boots graduated from the Omaha View school in 1890, and for two years and more had been a carrier of the **WORLD-HERALD**.
