An Omaha elementary school teacher will leave Monday for Monrovia, Liberia, for a year of study and college teaching.

That is only part of the adventure awaiting Mrs. Ione Williams Hanger, 3234 Bedford Avenue, a public school teacher here 15 years.

On her arrival in the West African republic, Mrs. Hanger will be a guest for one week of its long-time President, William V. S. Tubman.

Mrs. Hanger, seventh-grade teacher at Howard Kennedy School, is taking the trip under auspices of the National Council of the Episcopal Church. She is a member of St. Philip's Church.

She will work on the final requirements leading toward a doctorate in human relations.

at Monrovia, the capital of Liberia.

Mornings she will teach three classes and have charge of an educational seminar.

"In the afternoons, I'll go to school," she added.

Mrs. Hanger's last-minute thoughts weren't on the trip ahead.

She referred to Joslen Ione Johnson, born last month to Mrs. Hanger's daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. George Warren Johnson.
